- 5. How does Timothy Keller's statement about obedience and acceptance challenge or affirm your understanding of the gospel?
- 6. What do the sandals in Luke 15:22 symbolize about our freedom and identity as sons and daughters of God?
- 7. How does the concept of adoption in Romans 8:15 and Galatians 4:4-7 shape the way you relate to God as "Abba, Father"?
- 8. Reflect on 1 Peter 3:18—how does knowing Christ suffered to bring us to God deepen your understanding of "Whose you are"?
